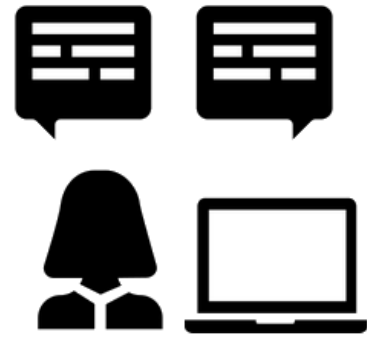


Prompting ChatGPT

Think of prompts as a **conversation** with a friend or colleague.

Note: ChatGPT refers to text exchanges as **conversations**.



Prompt Structure

Question or request or statement

- This is the main input provided to ChatGPT. It could be a query, a request for information, or a statement that requires a response.

Question or request + [attributes]

Attributes can include:

- **Context** provides information about the topic and the previous conversation that has taken place, if any.
- The **tone and style** of the prompt influences the response potentially to formal, informal, conversational, or very casual.
- **Keywords** can help ChatGPT understand the topic and generate a more relevant response.
- Specifying a **desired outcome** of the conversation can generate a response that meets their expectations.
- Indicating an **actor/role** impacts the response.

Use these prompt tips to allow ChatGPT to have an easier time understanding your prompts so it can return the best results.

1. **Be specific**
2. **Use complete sentences**
3. **Be clear and concise**
4. **Use correct grammar and spelling**
5. Use proper **punctuation**
6. Use **parentheses** and **brackets** to provide additional information or clarification and to indicate that you have made a change or correction to a quoted text. This helps ChatGPT understand

that the text in brackets/parentheses is not part of your original prompt.

7. Try **different approaches** (iterative)
 - a. Direct question: "What is the capital of France?"
 - b. Yes/No question: "Is Paris the capital of France?"
 - c. Statement: "I'm interested in learning more about French culture."
 - d. Command: "Please provide information on the history of France."
 - e. Conditional statement: "If I wanted to visit France, what cities should I prioritize?"
 - f. Comparison question: "How does the political system of France differ from that of the United States?"
 - g. Personal opinion question: "What is your favorite aspect of French cuisine?"
 - h. Hypothetical scenario: "If I were to move to France, what would be some cultural differences to be aware of?"
 - i. Multiple choice: "Which of the following French artists was a prominent figure in the Impressionist movement? a) Claude Monet b) Pablo Picasso c) Vincent van Gogh"
 - j. Open-ended question: "What else can you tell me about France?"
8. Use the **Rewrite** prompt to further customize and improve the previous result without retyping the original prompt
9. Use the **Format** prompt to shape results as a chart, table, paragraphs or lists
